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Areally, **Language and Linguistics in Melanesia** covers the linguistic situation in Melanesia, where one fourth of the world's languages are spoken, as symbolised by the cover design.

**Language and Linguistics
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The Third International Conference on Papuan Linguistics was held in Madang, Papua New Guinea, 15-18 September 1992.
