MINUTES OF THE TENTH ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING OF THE LINGUISTIC SOCIETY

Friday 17th September 1976, 4.00 p.m.

University of Papua New Guinea, Waigani

1. Minutes of AGM 1975

The minutes of the Annual General Meeting 1975 were accepted.

2. President's Report

The President, Tom Dutton, reported that not all the resolutions of the 1975 meeting have been fully carried out, but that activities of the society have increased and there are signs of a wider interest in the work of the Society. In particular he asked the members to note that this year we have four papers being read by PNG nationals, two of these in the new Student Section, and also interest in TESL has been

revived, with a Language Teaching Section at the Congress this year, 1976. He spoke for the Publicity Officer to point out that the number of meetings held over the year averaged more than one bimonthly, which was the target decided at the 1975 AGM.

3. Treasurer's Report

The Treasurer reported that the present financial situation of the Society was good, with a current balance of - K1,950. However, this figure does not represent absolute credit, since payments, notably for the publication of Kivung have still to be made.

4. Kivung: Editor's Report

The decision to print Kivung at the University has not been entirely productive and the First Issue for 1975 has not yet been published due to technical hitches. It is clear that in the future the University Printery will not be able to handle this publication, and alternative arrangements are actively being sought. I/1975 should be ready within the next two weeks. II/1975 is ready to go to press as soon as a printer can be found.

5. Business arising from 1-4

(a) Malcolm Ross (Goroka) pointed out that linguistic activities do place take, albeit on an ad hoc basis. He repeated the Publicity Officer's plea for better communications between Moresby and other centres.

Student interest was high.

(b) Andrew Taylor reported that there was apparently good student interest in non-specialist linguistic areas in the UoT. Public lectures on linguistic topics had been held during year, but not under aegis of the Society. A Lae sub-branch was suggested by Tom Dutton.

- (c) It was agreed that the Publicity Officer should notify other centres of all visitors of interest passing through Port Moresby. It was also agreed that SIL would provide non-technical speakers for Goroka Teachers' College and UoT, Lae.

The Universities, S.I.L. and other institutions in PNG were also well represented.

- * Tom Dutton is back from leave and reports that he has just finished a review of the Office of Information's new (1976) The Grammar and Dictionary of Hiri Motu. He says it is not very complimentary but contains some new ideas about the origin of the language. To appear in Kivung.
- * Iru Kakare, Research Officer in Hiri Motu in the Department of Language, UPNG has completed his field work on recording versions of early contact languages used between hiri trading partners. He is now working for the Institute of PNG Studies and will be seeking higher fortunes in the coming elections. A full report on the results of this work will appear later in the year.

University of Hawaii Linguists Visit Papua New Guinea

Early in 1976 a research project from the University of Hawaii started to study the Austronesian languages of the north coast in Madang and Morobe Provinces. The principal investigators of the NSF project, Drs. G.W. Grace and A.K. Pawley, sent out first two field workers, Pete Lincoln and Joel Bradshaw. In April, after both checked in with both UPNG and UniTech, Lincoln then Bradshaw visited Siboma village, 50 miles south of Lae, establishing a base for Bradshaw to study Numbami (or Siboma) language. During May, Lincoln patrolled from Wasu to the Gogol River to survey the Austronesian languages and find a base for himself, his wife and son. In June, he chose to establish himself in Gitua village, some thirty miles east of Wasu and near Sialum, in an area not patrolled. In June, George Grace came to PNG with a third field worker, Frank Lichtenberk. Through the generosity of a student at UPNG, Anthony Maburau and his family, Lichtenberk quite easily settled into the study of the language on Manam Island.

The overall aims of the project are to collect fresh data on three key languages to resolve some of the problems of subgrouping the Austronesian languages of Madang and Morobe Provinces and to enhance our understanding of Proto-Oceanic grammar and lexicon. George Grace and Pete Lincoln both gave public lectures both at UPNG and UniTech to clarify these goals. After some months in the field, Lincoln, Bradshaw, and Lichtenberk came to the 1976 Kivung of the L.S.P.N.G. Preliminary results of the Rai Coast survey were circulated at the meeting. The team gave some first impressions returning to the field, each wrote up and expanded some of these impressions. These papers together with the results of some desk research by George Grace and Andy Pawley will be appearing in a few months' time in the University of Hawaii Working Papers in Linguistics. Availability of copies will be announced in subsequent issues of this newsletter.

By January 1977, the team had begun to return to Hawaii. Joel Bradshaw is already there. Pete Lincoln is on his way, and Frank Lichtenberk is expected to leave for Hawaii in March. George Grace has been back for some months. His visit was to encourage other members of the team, to check on progress, and to explore the feasibility of continuing the same kind of project into other areas at some later date.

It is too early to judge the success of the project, but members of the team are still very optimistic that interesting results will soon emerge.
