1989 Linguistics Conferences

Both the 1989 Annual Conference of the Linguistic Society of Papua New Guinea and the Second International Conference on Pidgins and Creoles in Melanesia will be held at the University of Papua New Guinea in Waigani from Wednesday 28 June to Friday 30 June 1989. The two conferences will be held concurrently under the sponsorship of the Language and Literature Department for the convenience of participants who live and work far away from the Port Moresby area. Unfortunately, no funds are presently available for travel to or from either conference.

In addition to these conferences, the Conference of the Teachers of English as a Second Language Association of Papua New Guinea will be held at the University of Papua New Guinea earlier the same week. Call for papers: Linguistic Society of PNG

The theme of this year's Annual Conference of the Linguistic Society of Papua New Guinea will be: "Are Our Languages Dying?" This topic was chosen because it brings together linguists working in the political areas, sociolinguistics, historical linguistics, comparative linguistics, applied linguistics, and teachers. We invite papers on the theme of language death in Papua New Guinea. As usual, papers on other aspects of the study, development, teaching, or use of the languages of Papua New Guinea or other Melanesian languages are welcome.

Those planning to present papers at the conference should submit the title of their presentation together with a brief abstract (of no more than 125 words) by the last week in May. Abstracts should be sent to the Language and Literacy Department, University of Papua New Guinea, Box 320, University P.O., Papua New Guinea.
